### **Assistant Principals' Report**

It has been very pleasing to see the amount of green chronicle posts that Junior School students are receiving. There has been a focus on students maintaining positive and respectful relationships with their fellow students and their teachers. Once again I am very pleased to see so many of our students displaying this every day. It helps everyone feel welcome and encourages students to actively seek help both in and out of the classroom. As a community it would be great if these messages can also be supported at home, we have some great kids here and it is through this ongoing communication that the entire College community will continue to be strengthened.

### **Buildings and Grounds update**

Building works have continued on the E Block roof by McCormack. Roofing sheets and window fittings have been replaced to fix leaks and interior works are now being attended to. This will improve the safety of our Science rooms and allow our students and staff to continue improving the learning outcomes through practical work. Our College library is nearing completion as well with some minor cosmetic changes and furniture to be installed. Watching this project evolve has been very interesting and I hope that students appreciate the space when it officially opens in the coming weeks.

I received a call earlier this week from Asbestos Reform advising me that they will be attending the College in the holidays to remove the remaining asbestos from the College. With only 6 items either containing or suspected to contain asbestos left in the College I am very happy to report that these will all be removed at this time. Once this has been completed I will be inviting Coffey Environments Australia to return to the College to conduct another Asbestos Materials Assessment to ensure that there is no further asbestos in the College and to provide us with clearance documentation. This will ensure that the safety of our students and staff will be maintained during ongoing maintenance works and these can be conducted safely during school times.

We will be looking at areas of the College that require some attention and arranging working bees in the near future. If you are able to spend some time helping with any of these projects it would be much appreciated. Stay tuned for more information.

This week, Year 12 PASE sessions, and period 3 & 4 on Tuesday, were devoted to strategies to help students cope with stress during their Year 12 studies.

In PASE, students spent time with their home group teachers discussing the impact that stress can have on physical and emotional wellbeing. At the same time, students were encouraged to accept stress is a normal part of the Year 12 experience and that the stress is temporary. At the end of the day, taking action is often the best way to reduce the impact stress has on their lives and improve their ability to cope with it. Actions such as staying on top of course requirements, planning for the busy times to manage commitments, communicating with teachers and taking time to exercise and relax to look after their physical wellbeing, as well.

The retreat sessions in period 3 & 4 on Tuesday gave students the opportunity to select from activities on offer including guided relaxation massage, meditation & yoga, outdoor circuit training and a walk at Emerald Lake Park. It was great to see students involving themselves and learning about the ways physical and relaxation activities can improve our ability to cope with stress, the influence such activities have on reducing the likelihood and symptoms of depression and anxiety disorders, as well as enjoying a common experience together.

We now look forward to our Term 2 Retreat Day on the 23rd April, where the focus shifts to teamwork, persistence and resilience. We will travel to the Summit Adventure Park for some physical team challenges – prepare to get filthy!!!

## Mathematics at Emerald Secondary College

This year at Emerald Secondary, we have changed the way Maths is being taught in the classroom. We are now using Oxford textbooks and providing a variety of differentiated learning to suit student abilities. There is also a modified Maths program that was offered to some students as part of a Maths Intervention Program. Some students will also be selected to be part of a Maths Extension program.

### Quicksmart Mathematics Program



In March, we will be re-introducing Quicksmart Mathematics Program. This program was run at Emerald Secondary until 2012 with great success. The *QuickSmart* mathematics lessons begin with a review of the focus facts, starting with those already known, and move on to those yet to be remembered. Teacher-led discussion and questioning about the relationship between number facts and ways to recall them merge into simple mathematics fact practice activities.

### Enrichment Activities

Students in Years 7-10 spend 2 periods each week developing their critical thinking, problem solving and reasoning skills. The tasks are designed with a low floor, high ceiling. This means that students of all abilities can access the tasks. Students will be writing in a reflection journal after these tasks to reflect on what they have learnt about themselves as a Mathematics learner.

### Upcoming Pi Day 14th March



Pi Day is an annual celebration of the mathematical constant  $\pi$ . Pi Day is observed on March 14<sup>th</sup> since 3, 1, and 4 are the first 3 significant digits of  $\pi$ . The symbol represents a constant – the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter – which is approximately 3.14159..... There will be lots of fun activities happening on this day.

### Maths Competition 9<sup>th</sup> August



This year, Emerald Secondary College will be running an Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC). Students in Years 7-12 will be invited to be part of the competition. Students are asked to solve 30 problems in 75 minutes. The problems are designed to test mathematical thinking, and questions get more difficult throughout the competition.

### Mathematics Olympiad



Students in Years 7-8 of the SEAL program will be part of the Maths Olympiad which is a problem solving competition for high achieving students. There are five dates that students will sit a test of 5 questions in a time limit of 30 minutes.

### Mathspace



We are very excited to introduce a new program to Emerald Secondary this year. Mathspace is a program with mathematics curriculum from Grade 3 to Year 12. This is another way that we are differentiating to provide for students of all

abilities. More information is in the letter being sent with the Newsletter.

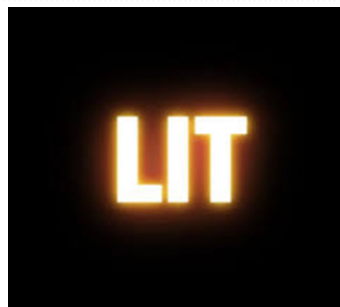

The phrases our students are using are clever and creative and we shouldn't be 'triggered' by them. Shakespeare created phrases to create imagery of the moment; his audience could immediately connect because they were relevant and related to their lifestyle.

It is what it is. It's 'Lit Fam'. No need to be 'shook' about it. Just get with it and connect.

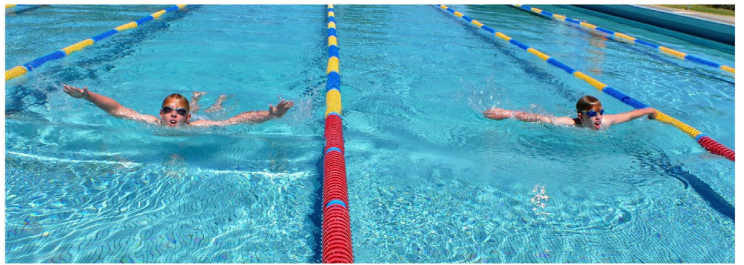
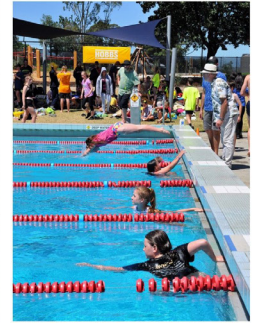

# ESC SWIMMING CARNIVAL 2018





## FARM SCHOOL

This year in the Junior School we have continued our partnership with two local Secondary Schools, Upwey High School and Sherbrooke Secondary College, in order to provide hands on education at an alternate local based education setting. This partnership provides an opportunity for many of our students to connect further with their learning at a local farm in Woori Yallock. The farm is located at the site of the original Woori Yallock Primary School that was converted into an educational farm setting in 1990.

Farm School provides Personal Development and Leadership Programs for secondary students. Students that participate in the program cover some of the following topics:

- Building connections to their school and local community
- Increasing their understanding of the natural environment and our past, including our indigenous community
- Developing positive peer networks
- Increasing their confidence and self-awareness

Most excitingly, students this year are completing their Certificate 1 in Conservation and Land Management. This nationally recognised course provides opportunities that can lead to future vocational training in the areas of land management and/or agriculture, viticulture and horticulture. However, past students have also used the course as a pathway into a diverse range of areas including carpentry, building and mechanics.

Aaron Liversidge (Yr 8), Luke Pettigrew (Yr 8), Declan Marr Reid (Yr 9) and Dylan Pilcher Crowe (Yr 9) have all been enjoying Farm school so far this year. Last week they spent the day at Kilkunda Beach for a field trip. They explored a range of sites that were rich in cultural history, including remnants of the old coal mining industry that Kilkunda is famous for, as well as some sites that were very important to the Indigenous people of the area. This week students also spent time at Healesville Sanctuary, learning about the koala leaf plantation, as the Sanctuary actually source leaves from the Farm School a few times a year.
